By breaking down traditional silos between academic disciplines, STRIDE facilitates a more holistic approach to research and education, ensuring that legal education is informed by diverse fields of knowledge. This trans-disciplinary approach is vital for addressing contemporary legal challenges, such as climate change, data privacy, and social justice, which require insights from multiple domains.

3.2. Key Components of STRIDE

STRIDE comprises three key components that collectively enhance research capabilities and foster an environment conducive to innovation:

The program's focus on innovation fosters a research culture that encourages students and faculty to pursue groundbreaking work, ultimately contributing to the development of legal scholarship that addresses contemporary challenges.

4. UGC Initiatives -Promoting Inclusivity and Research Capacity

4.1. Financial Investments in Research

The UGC plays a vital role in enhancing legal education through various financial initiatives. The expenditures for collaborative programs in 2021-2022 demonstrate a commitment to improving educational quality and

research capacity in legal education. For instance, significant funding was allocated for initiatives such as the Indo-Israel Joint Research Project and the Indo-German Partnership in Higher Education, which aim to foster academic collaboration and knowledge exchange between Indian institutions and their international counterparts.

The UGC allocated Rs. 2143.64 lakh in 2021 to support these centers, reinforcing the importance of diverse perspectives in legal education and aligning with SDG 10, which aims to reduce inequalities (United Nations, 2015). By focusing on social exclusion, these centers facilitate research that addresses systemic inequalities in legal education and practice, contributing to a more equitable society.

4.3. Scholarships and Fellowships

The UGC's scholarship programs aimed at women and SC/ST candidates foster inclusivity and diversity in legal academia. Each program provides 100 slots annually, contributing to a more equitable legal education system and supporting SDG 5, which seeks gender equality (United Nations, 2015). The financial support provided through these initiatives enables underrepresented groups to pursue advanced degrees in law, thus enriching the academic community and ensuring a broader range of perspectives in legal scholarship.

5. Analysis of Findings

5.1. Global Collaboration

The integration of NEP 2020, STRIDE, and UGC initiatives highlights the growing importance of international collaboration in legal education. The UGC's collaborative academic programs with foreign countries, such as the Stipendium Hungaricum Programme, exemplify this trend, as 173 Indian students were awarded scholarships in 2021. These programs facilitate knowledge exchange and cultural engagement, preparing students for global legal practice and fostering a sense of interconnectedness among future legal professionals.

5.2. Research-Driven Framework

Substantial investments in research, as demonstrated by UGC's funding, promote a culture of inquiry and critical thinking essential for future legal practitioners. The emphasis on interdisciplinary research aligns with the UN's call for partnerships to achieve the SDGs, particularly SDG 17, which encourages strengthening the means of implementation and revitalizing global partnerships for sustainable development (United Nations, 2015).

Enhancing Higher Education in India: Budget Provisions and Strategic Initiatives

The Indian higher education sector has been undergoing significant transformations, particularly in light of the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, which aims to make education more inclusive and accessible. A vital aspect of this transformation involves budget allocations and schemes that support various initiatives to enhance the quality and reach of higher education.

Budget Overview: A Commitment to Higher Education

The Department of Higher Education's budget for the fiscal years 2021-22 and 2022-23 reflects a strategic commitment to improve educational infrastructure, promote research, and enhance student welfare. Notable allocations include the establishment of various centrally sponsored schemes, digital education initiatives, and financial aid for students.

For instance, in 2021-22, the budget allocated ₹3,000 crores to the National Education Mission under the Rashtriya Uchhatar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA) aimed at enhancing the quality of higher education institutions across India.

This figure was slightly reduced in 2022-23 but remains a significant investment in educational infrastructure (Government of India, 2022). Furthermore, the budget for student financial aid saw slight reductions, from ₹2,089.25 crores in 2021-22 to ₹2,077.85 crores in 2022-23. This reduction highlights the ongoing challenges faced in maintaining financial support amidst growing demands (Government of India, 2022).

Key Schemes and Initiatives

- 1. Centrally Sponsored Schemes: The budget earmarked substantial funds for various schemes aimed at improving the quality of education and research. The World Class Institutions scheme, for example, was allocated ₹1,710 crores in 2021-22, reflecting the government's commitment to establishing global standards in higher education. This initiative focuses on creating institutions that not only meet but exceed international benchmarks for education (Ministry of Education, 2021).
- 2. Student Financial Aid: Scholarships and financial aid schemes are critical in promoting inclusivity in higher education. The Special Scholarship Scheme for Jammu and Kashmir, with a consistent allocation of ₹225 crores, is designed to support students from this region, facilitating their access to quality education (Government of India, 2022). Additionally, the PM Research Fellowship program, which received ₹150 crores in the budget, aims to promote research among postgraduate students, thereby enhancing India's research capacity (Ministry of Education, 2021).
- 3. **Digital Education Initiatives**: The push for digital education is evident in the allocations for the **National Mission in Education through ICT**, which increased from ₹83.71 crores in 2021-22 to ₹400 crores in 2022-23. This initiative reflects the government's recognition of the importance of technology in education, especially in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, which necessitated a shift to online learning (Ministry of Education, 2021).
- 4. Establishment of Centers for Social Exclusion and Inclusive Policy: The University Grants Commission (UGC) has established 32 centers across different universities to focus on research related to social exclusion, underlining the theoretical and policy importance of this area. In 2021, the UGC released ₹2,143.64 lakhs to support this initiative, highlighting the government's commitment to fostering inclusive education (UGC, 2021).

Strategic Implications of the Budget Allocations

The increasing focus on trans-disciplinary research through initiatives like **STRIDE** (Scheme for Trans-disciplinary Research through Higher Education Institutes for National Development and Entrepreneurship) signals a shift towards fostering innovation and collaboration across disciplines. This approach not only enhances research capacity but also nurtures a culture of innovation within higher education institutions (Ministry of Education, 2021).

Moreover, the establishment of post-doctoral fellowships aimed at women and SC/ST candidates reinforces the commitment to inclusivity in higher education. For instance, the UGC's Post-Doctoral Fellowship for Women, with an expenditure of ₹5.20 crores in 2021-22, and the corresponding scheme for SC/ST candidates receiving ₹3.97 crores reflect a targeted approach to empower underrepresented groups in academia (UGC, 2021).

The budget provisions for higher education in India signify a strategic commitment to enhancing the quality, accessibility, and inclusivity of educational institutions. By focusing on infrastructure development, research capacity, and financial aid, the Indian government aims to create a robust educational ecosystem that meets the diverse needs of its population.
